


Lawn Section of the Cemetery (area developed in 2008 and after)

Lot corner markers Each plot (5x10 gravesite) is marked by underground metal markers – stone corner markers are not required.

- **Cemetery Funeral Fee for each Cremation Urn/Vault Burial (collected by Funeral Director)......\$300.00 (note: this fee includes a \$50 deposit amount for purchasing and placing a 12" x 12 x 4" stone grave marker over the location of the vault burial. If a permanent grave marker is placed by the family within 90 days of the funeral the deposit of \$50 is refunded to the family.)

 Note: In the event that a Funeral Director is not involved in the burial of a Cremated Remains Vault payment of the Cemetery Funeral Fee must be paid directly to the Flynn Cemetery Association, Inc. prior to burial.
- *<u>Three Mile Radius Rule</u> (Old Section of Cemetery only) Persons who were born within a 3 mile radius of the cemetery property and are a part of a family with an existing lot in the old part of the cemetery burial rights do not have to be purchased if room is available. All other fees are applicable. See attached map.
- ** <u>Cemetery Funeral Fee</u> is due at time of burial. This fee is not included with any purchase of Burial Rights.





<u>Appendix B to the Cemetery Rules and Regulations - Miniumum Requirements for Burial</u> Vaults and Headstones (Grave Markers)

Burial Vaults for Regular Casket Burial –

Outer burial containers or burial vaults are required by the Flynn Cemetery Rules and Regulations to prevent the ground from sinking in above the casket.

A burial vault is a lined and sealed outer receptacle that houses the casket. It protects the casket from the weight of the earth and heavy maintenance equipment that will pass over the grave. It also helps resist water and preserves the beauty of the cemetery by preventing the ground from settling.

- Only manufactured prefabricated reinforced concrete vaults are approved.
- Wooden vaults of any sort are prohibited.
- Built-in-place masonry burial enclosures are prohibited.

Burial Vaults for Cremated Remains –

Urns or other vessels containing cremated ashes must be enclosed in a sealed burial vault or other enclosure designed for that purpose when interred. Burial of the vault top shall be no less than 12 inches below the earth level of the gravesite.

Minimum specifications for cremated remains burial vaults for burial of urns or other ash container are as follows:

<u>Material</u>: Prefabricated concrete, stainless steel, or polymer (pastic) designed for burial of urns and capable of being sealed.

<u>Miscellaneous</u>: Permanent means of identification of the enclosed remains shall be attached to the top of the vault container.

Headstones (grave markers)

Minimum requirements for headstone markers as follows:

Old Section of the Cemetery (area developed prior to 2008)

<u>Standard casket interment –</u> The marker must be of granite or marble. There are no restrictions for size except as noted previously in the Rules and Regulations but must fit within the width of the identified plot or plots. The marker shall have, at a minimum, the name and date of death of the individual and must be clearly engraved thereon.

<u>Cremated remains interment</u> – a granite or marble marker slab no smaller than 12" x 12" x 4" shall be placed over the center of the location of the urn vault burial. The marker shall have, at a minimum, the name and date of birth and date of death of the individual clearly engraved thereon. In addition, the stone shall have "C" engraved on the stone to indicate "cremated remains".



New Section of the Cemetery (area developed in 2008 and after)

<u>Standard casket interment</u> – Same as Old Section of Cemetery.

<u>Cremated remains interment – Same as Old Section of Cemetery.</u> See also Appendix C requirements.

I. For 5' x 10' plots dedicated to burial of cremated remains only –

A maximum of six Burial Vaults for Cremated Remains may be interred in a single 5' \times 10' plot as requested and approved by the Burial Rights Holder. - (See attached sketch for layout of cremated vault placement in a new 5' \times 10' plot).

- 1. The vaults must be placed in an orderly arrangement in the plot. The 60" wide by 120" (5'x10') plot shall be Approximately divided as follows:
- 2. 12" x 60" shall be reserved for a permanent headstone for the plot.
- 3. 12" x 60" shall be reserved for a permanent footstone for the plot.
- 4. Six locations symmetrically located about the longitudinal axis of the plot between headstone and footstone reserves are to be utilized for the placement of the vaults containing the urns or other receptacles. See attached sketch for placement of cremation ash vault containing an urn or other container.
- A. Each vault must be buried so as to provide separation from other cremation vaults already placed or to be placed in the plot.
- B. A minimum of 12 inches of soil over the top of the vault is required. The required Cremation Stone Marker must be placed in this 12" cover.
- C. The headstone of the plot should include the names, dates of birth, and dates of death of all individuals buried in the plot. When a cremation vault is added the name should be added to the plot headstone.
- D. In addition to the headstone a permanent 12" x 12" x 4" engraved stone marker shall be placed at ground level centered over each cremation vault to identify it with the name of the cremated individual. The marker should have a prominent engraved letter "C" to indicate that it is over cremated remains. See attached "Standard Minimum Cremation Stone" sketch for minimum information placement on the stone.


Miniumum Requirements for Burial of Vaults Containing Cremated Ash Containers

II. For 5' x 10' Plots where casketed remains are already buried and a cremated remains vault is to be added – (Note: This must be approved by the Flynn Cemetery Trustees prior to placement).


A maximum of two Burial Vaults for Cremated Remains may be interred in a single 5' x 10' plot or between two plots as requested and approved by the Burial Rights Holder and the Cemetery Trustees. (See attached sketch for layout of cremated vault placement in an existing 5' x 10' casket burial plot).

- A. A minimum of 12 inches of soil over the top of the vault is required.
- B. A permanent 12" x 12" x 4" engraved stone marker shall be placed at ground level centered over each cremation vault to identify it with the name of the cremated individual. The marker should have a prominent engraved letter "C" to indicate that it is over cremated remains. *See attached sketch for minimum requirements for Cremation Stone.*
- C. Upon approval by the Cemetery Trustees a cremation vault may be placed between two existing 5' x 10' plots where casketed burials have already taken place.
